



FIRST READING: 1 Kings 19:15-16, 19-21

In the story preceding today's reading, the prophet Elijah flees for his life to the security of God's mountain. There God reveals to Elijah that there are still other faithful people in Israel and commissions him to anoint new leaders, including his own successor, Elisha.

¹⁵Then the LORD said to [Elijah,] "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. ¹⁶Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place.

¹⁹So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by

him and threw his mantle over him. ²⁰He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" ²¹He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.

SECOND READING: Galatians 5:1, 13-25

For Paul, the freedom Christ gives is not permission to do whatever we want. It is the invitation to be what we could not be otherwise. The power and guidance of Christ's Holy Spirit produce a different kind of life, one marked by the fruit of this Holy Spirit.

¹For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

¹³For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. ¹⁴For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁵If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

¹⁶Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. ¹⁸But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. ¹⁹Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, ²⁰idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, ²¹envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²²By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. ²⁴And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

GOSPEL LESSON Luke 9:51-62

On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; ⁵³but they did not receive him, because his face was set toward Jerusalem. ⁵⁴When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" ⁵⁵But he turned and rebuked them. ⁵⁶Then they went on to another village.

⁵⁷As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." ⁵⁸And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." ⁵⁹To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." ⁶⁰But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." ⁶¹Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." ⁶²Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

SERMON

Rev. Mary E. Zupansic

REFLECTION: FOR THOSE AT HOME

What does it mean to be a disciple? Today's texts answer this question in various ways. Elisha was given the burdensome mantle of Elijah. Up until this point he'd simply been a student of the great prophet. Then, without much warning, Elijah passed the leader-

ship responsibility onto him and transitioned dramatically from this life into the next. Because it was an immense responsibility, Elisha asked his master for a double portion of his spirit and was given it. God generously provided for Elisha so that he could faithfully continue Elijah's work.

Paul spells out the mission before us. Last week, he pointed out the power we've been given through our baptism. Now he explains that with the Spirit of God within, our lives should be different. He contrasts the work of the flesh with the fruit of the Spirit. We are called to use our freedom in Christ for good, so that God can transform our lives and empower us for ministry.


In the gospel, Jesus faces more resistance from those he's called. People conjure up all sorts of excuses why they can't start right away, but Jesus will have none of it. He's calling and he wants a straight answer now. You're in or you're out. He makes it clear that answering his call and living the life of discipleship requires no less than *everything*.


These passages are difficult. They show how much God is demanding of those who wish to follow. Those called are asked to give everything. No wonder there is resistance. Yet, they also remind us that the Spirit will support our work and, in turn, give us everything to enable us to answer the call.







COMMEMORATIONS THIS WEEK

Cyril, Bishop of Alexandria, died 444

Monday, June 27, 2022

Cyril defended the orthodox teachings about the person of Christ. After a conflict involving all of the major Christian leaders of the time, it was decided that Cyril's interpretation, that Christ's person included both divine and human natures, was correct.

Irenaeus, Bishop of Lyons, died around 202 Tuesday, June 28, 2022

This important early church leader tried very hard to hold to the faith handed down by the apostles. An opponent of the movement known as gnosticism, Irenaeus was one of the first to speak of the church as catholic, or linked together.

Peter and Paul, Apostles Wednesday, June 29, 2022

These two strong-willed apostles are the pillars of the church in the first generation after Christ. Peter was one of the Twelve, one who both offered a glorious confession of faith and later denied knowing Jesus. Paul once led the persecution of Christians, then was converted and helped bring the faith to non-Jewish people.

Catherine Winkworth, died 1878; John Mason Neale, died 1866; hymn translators Friday, July 1, 2022

Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek

hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

JUNE COUNCIL REPORT

This year's Synod Assembly in Champaign was the first week of June; our theme was "Singing the Lord's Song in a Strange Land". It was so joyful to join together again, in person, with churches across our synod! In addition to conducting necessary church business, we enjoyed messages from ecumenical guest speaks from the Presbyterian, Methodist and Catholic churches and had the opportunity to spend time "Dwelling in the Word" with congregations from our conference. We sang together and worshipped together. We built a beautiful art project, and watched videos of the great work occurring in the world, thanks to the generosity of our congregations. One speaker challenged us to approach our troubled world by listening, learning, thinking, and praying, before we take action. We were encouraged to stop worrying about what we can't do as an aging congregation, but instead focus on what is possible for us and to look for shared ministry opportunities in our communities. The assembly closed with an invigorating sing-along of favorite hymns, including an original song written by one of our Pastors. There is nothing better than singing those simple childhood hymns with a large group...we all know the words and melody!

The council met for our June meeting on Thursday June 19. Pastor Mary led us in "Dwelling in the Word" session with a study of Galatians 5:13-25. This passage talks about the commandment to love your neighbor as yourself. My favorite verse from the passage is verse 22, "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control". As we move forward this year, we will be gathering a small group to participate in Dwelling in the Word sessions with our "sister church", St Paul in Peoria. The council has also endorsed the use of Dwelling in the Word at the beginning of church committee meetings, to help us focus on scripture as we go about the business of the congregation.

Committee Activity - written or verbal reports were received from Community Service and Evangelism committees. Community Service committee is finalizing plans to provide meals to Helping Hands on 6/27 & 9/12 and working to better organize donated items for our micro-pantry. Evangelism committee reported on the takeaways from their recent book series. One recommendation was to encourage all church committees to start their monthly meetings with Dwelling in the Word sessions; council endorsed this recommendation. Although Property committee did not meet in June, it was reported the light project to replace the sanctuary spotlight bulbs was scheduled for June 21 and lighting in the nursery and main bathrooms would be updated to LED

fixtures on the same date. Next Sunday, look up and notice all the spotlights are working! Much thanks to Mike Barker for his oversight on this months long project.

Finances - For the month of May, income of \$19,573 was \$2,021 less than operating fund expenses of \$21,594. At the end of May, we had a year to date deficit of \$12,278. May expenses included a quarterly insurance payment and the cost of tree removal/trimming. Members gave directed offerings of \$525 to our building fund, \$565 to Grace Food pantry, \$525 to World Hunger and \$320 to the roof replacement fund.

COVID - The council reviewed current COVID statistics for Sangamon County and agreed to maintain our current masking policy. We require mask use by unvaccinated individuals when they are in the building. Masks remain optional for those who are vaccinated.

The council sadly acknowledged the recent loss of council member Jim Titone. Jim was always quick to offer a kind word and to volunteer his help, regardless of the need. He skillfully guided our technology efforts and was crucial to the successful procurement and installation of equipment needed to enhance our in-person and livestream worship services. The council approved a motion appointing Adam Miller to fill the remainder of Jim's one year term.

We continue efforts to hire a new office manager/financial secretary. If you know someone who would be a great addition to the church office, please encourage them to apply. In the interim, much thanks to the church members and Pastor Mary as they cover these duties.
